Pastor's Page

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

For weeks we have been following the news on the war in Ukraine. It is a war "on" the people of Ukraine. I was about to describe what is happening in Ukraine but I have not the words. Evil exists in the world; this war is evil. The people of that nation have died and suffered as they have continued to defend their nation.

We do what we can. See the article about the response of KidKnits in this edition of the Epistle. We have collected money to be sent in support of the Ukrainian people, over \$5,500 so far, and we continue to collect money. Member congregations of the ELCA have given millions of dollars in support of this effort. Many in the larger community are using holy imagination to respond to the needs of these people. One effort that has received much publicity is Door County Candle Company's fundraising campaign. Volunteers from the community are coming together in making Ukrainian candles and selling them. Others are providing meals and treats for the workers. The members of this company had an idea and the community is responding. I have heard many of the stories.

Yet this seems insufficient. A few weeks ago, I participated with other area clergy in leading 'A Service of Prayer for Ukraine.' To whom do we go when we lament, when we cry out, when we feel lost, when we feel we are not or cannot do what needs to be done? We go to God.

That night we heard music, readings, words of lament, and hope in Christ. And we prayed and prayed. We will continue to pray. What follows is my prayer from that evening.

From Romans:

The Spirit intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words.

Merciful God,

We pray to you the innocents of Ukraine, at least that's what I signed up to do tonight. Innocents, maybe at one time the word was less complex to define: children, elderly folks, those who couldn't care for themselves. But not today.

Lord have mercy

This prayer has become a struggle for me, maybe it is a struggle for more than me. It's not that it's hard to pray, but who are these innocents in this war, brought to the people of Ukraine? Lord have mercy

The Ukrainian people have done nothing to bring this war upon themselves. They were going about their daily lives, working, learning, serving, playing, singing, dancing, crying, laughing, giving birth. Lord have mercy

The innocents are the people of Ukraine, not only the children and those who can't care for themselves. but they are a nation, a people of innocents. Wherever they are, in a bunker and basement in Ukraine, or on the road to, or in a land which will be a place where they find refuge, we pray for them all. Lord have mercy

Lord, yes there are the children, some accompanied by mothers, some traveling alone, and there are some young and old who are being wheeled out of the Ukraine in wheelchairs and shopping carts, and all of them are leaving someone behind. Show your healing presence and care of them all, and for those who meet them on the road, and show your healing presence to those who remain in Ukraine. Lord have mercy

Merciful Lord, God with us all, God with the people of Ukraine.

Lord have mercy Christ have mercy Lord have mercy

Come Holy Spirit, come quickly, come quickly with healing, and peace.

Food Pantry

Donations to the Northern Door food pantries were greatly appreciated. They were also very appreciative of the donation to the Door County Coalition.

The food pantries of Door County, working in partnership with United Way and the Community Foundation, have created the Door County Food Pantry Coalition. It's our community's coordinated, sustainable response to providing food and other supplies to people who are struggling during the global pandemic and economic recession. If you're able to help out, please consider making a donation or volunteering your time. There is no qualification process to access the pantries during this health crisis. Yet please remember that the Door County Food Pantry Coalition is NOT paid for by the government. Our pantries are able to help you because of the generous donations of your friends and neighbors. If you're having a hard time making ends meet, the members of the Food Pantry Coalition want to extend a helping hand. All the member pantries have committed to several safety precautions to avoid the spread of the coronavirus. Everyone offers "contactless" pick-up. They also ask that you practice social distancing and wear a mask when you are at a pantry. Further, all pantries have agreed to quarantine donated food items for at least 72 hours before distributing them to the public. While everyone is working together through the Coalition, each food pantry operates in a different way. Some pantries are only able to provide non-perishable items, while others can offer refrigerated and frozen foods. A few pantries also make toiletries and other household supplies available. In some cases, the pantries allow you to come into their facility to pick out what you need. Others take your "order" for what you need then bring it outside to you. Please look through the list of the pantries to understand what each one offers and how they operate. Then decide which one is best suited to help you during your time of need.

Local Benevolence

Local Benevolence Spotlight: Childcare in Door County

This month Church Council approved donations to both of Door County's only licensed non-profit childcare centers. The centers are Northern Door Childcare (Sister Bay) and Door Community Child Development Center (Sturgeon Bay).

Why childcare? The need for quality, affordable childcare consistently ranks as one of Door County's biggest challenges. It's a fairly complicated issue with four components that each need to be addressed to solve the current situation. (This is a really simplified summary - The United Way of Door County has a much more detailed study.)

Challenges:

1. Quality: Of course, all parents want good care for their kids. This includes good facilities and great teachers/care givers. This comes at a price.

2. Quantity: Both of Door County's daycares have double digit waiting lists. Without availability a parent can't work. This is truly a factor in our workforce shortage.

3. Affordability: Did you know that childcare runs about \$10,000 per year in DC? That's per child!

4. Childcare workers: Many of the childcare providers are college grads (usually in Early Childhood Education) but they often make about \$14 - \$16hr. The industry has a large shortage of workers due to low wages.

One of the biggest factors in why this is now such a crisis is because the current model of childcare only breaks even when 4-5yr olds attended. They required a lower staff to child ratio. Now public schools provide 4K so the daycares run at a higher cost. To get more childcare workers they need higher wages. Both our centers are currently trying to hire. If they can get the staff, they can add more kids. Better wages could help issues #1, 2, and 4 but then #3 may suffer. It is a challenge!

Happily, this issue is finally getting attention. Access to quality childcare is vital to children and important for attracting and retaining employees. Our donations help each center with their specific needs. It may be for a "scholarship" to a family to help pay for childcare, a bonus for childcare employees to help retain them, or for equipment or supplies that a center needs. You will likely be hearing more on the childcare issue as leaders in our community are working for solutions. Thank you, congregation, for helping!


Sleep In Heavenly Peace

The Barbizon Hotel for women first opened its doors on East 63rd Street in 1928 and this book focuses on the changing cultural perceptions of women's ambition throughout the last century, set against the backdrop of the most famous theater of aspiration, New York City. This was a residential hotel that provided maid service and food on site, provisions that allowed the women to focus on their professions without the burden of housework. Writers, artists, secretarial students, models and actresses all used the Barbizon as a stepping stone to success.

Based on the Local Benevolence ministry recommendation, a special \$1,000 urgent need donation was approved to help victims of the Butch's Bar fire.

St. Paul's Ukraine Relief contributions have reached \$5,518.00, with more donations anticipated. The financial support is in the process of being remitted to Lutheran World Relief to take advantage of a challenge match, which will double the impact of our donations.

The "Sleep in Heavenly Peace" bed-building service project is underway. Jeff Kuchenbecker is coordinating the publicity and congregational support for St. Paul's involvement in this synod initiative.

Several of the council's "re-engagement" activities are in the initial planning stages. More details to follow as timelines are finalized!

PARKING LOT WORSHIP CONTINUES


ACTIVITIES INSIDE CHURCH BUILDING

Home, hospital, nursing home, etc. visits resume with Pastor wearing a mask.

Financial Update & Vanco



• FYTD = Fiscal Year-to-Date. St. Paul Lutheran'sfiscal year begins on 01-Oct.

- The 2021-22 fiscal year Ministry Expenses budget is \$250,954
- Regular Offerings in the five months of the current fiscal year were greater than budgetedby \$8,472 (\$108,672 - \$100,200) and were \$7,702 greater than received in the comparable prior year period
- Ministry Expenses were higher than in the prior year period by \$9,274, principally reflecting a full year payment of Insurance premiums, higher Benevolenceexpenses and increased heating costs (which were approximately \$1,600, \$6,000 and \$1,500 higher, respectively)



- FYTD = Fiscal Year-to-Date. St. Paul Lutheran'sfiscal year begins on 01-Oct.
- Offerings in the first five months of the 2021-22 fiscal year varied substantially (i.e., \$20,350 in October,\$11,959 in November,\$35,939 in December,\$20,282 in January and \$20,143 in February, respectively)
- Monthly Ministry Expenses were less variable, ranging from \$17,927 to \$24,469 in the currentfiscal year-to-date period, and totaled \$23,808 in February
- The higher Ministry Expenses recorded in Decemberand February reflected the timing of Benevolenced is bursements
- The variability of monthly Offerings highlights the need for strong ongoing liquidity management

Online Giving Platform Changes

Since April 2019, our online giving platform has been provided by Vanco Payments Solutions ("Vanco") using a home page that was designed by, and unique to, St. Paul Lutheran Church. Our unique home page has historically been accessed by most of our members using our "Give Online" button that directly takes you to the Vanco online giving application.

Vanco has recently made a systems enhancement that has changed the home page to make it more uniform with its other nonprofit users. Following these system changes, the new home page for our online giving platform is accessible through the link on the St. Paul web site home page. If you access the online giving site using the St. Paul web site, you will be linked into the new online giving home page for St. Paul Lutheran.

If you access the online giving site using the "Give Online" button, you will still see the old St. Paul online giving home page. However, Vanco has advised us that our historic home page will be deactivated at some future date. Therefore, we are planning to take steps to transfer the link using our "Give Online" button (seen on many of the emails you receive from St. Paul) from the old home page to the new Vanco home page for St. Paul Lutheran. In the meantime, your current User ID and password for the Vanco online giving platform will still work whether you access the online giving site using our web site home page or the "Give Online" button.

Council Meeting Minutes

Wednesday, February 16, 2022

Mission: St. Paul Lutheran Church is a welcoming family bringing Christ into people's lives by developing, nurturing and supporting disciples.

Absent/Excused: None

Others Attendees: None

Meeting Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Betty Eisenhauer at 6:30 P.M.

Devotions

Bob read a devotion and opened the meeting with a prayer.

Agenda Approval

The previously circulated agenda was reviewed and accepted by acclamation.

Minutes

The previously circulated minutes from the January 19, 2022 meeting, following a motion made by Karen and seconded by Cathy, were approved.

Record of Electronic Business Approval

Betty reported that the Council voted to return to in-sanctuary and parking lot worship starting on February 20.

The Council also authorized the purchase of a new office computer from Dell to be set up by Bob Kufrin.

REPORTS AND MINISTRY ACTION ITEMS

Pastor's Report

Pastor Frank reviewed the discussion from the prior meeting to remind the Council to keep their faith in the forefront as they make decisions.

Pastor Frank mentioned the Ash Wednesday service would have an Abundance theme and would be in sanctuary, on-line and in the parking lot. Bible study is starting again after Easter.

Financial Report

- Greg reported that, financially speaking, the first four months of the fiscal year were relatively strong. Regular Offerings in the October January period totaled \$88,500 and were greater than budgeted by almost \$8,400 and almost \$300 higher than the comparable prior year period. Ministry Expenses were higher than the prior year period by approximately \$3,400 principally reflecting higher Local Benevolence outlays and increased heating costs which were partially offset by \$2,000 of lower expenses incurred for the Administrative Assistant and Organists. January's Offerings totaled approximately \$20,300 while Ministry Expenses were approximately \$18,300.
- Greg led a review of financial trends for the period from October, 2018 through January 2022. He discussed Offering trends by quarter and highlighted how financially difficult our winter months generally are as many members reside elsewhere during those months. He concluded (i) by noting that while our Offerings vary substantially by month, our Ministry Expenses are less variable and (ii) requesting that authorization be granted to invest \$10,000 of undesignated funds in U.S. Treasury Series I Savings Bonds.
- Motion by Pastor Frank, seconded by Bob, to approve the financial report. All ayes.
- Motion by Greg, seconded by Pastor Frank, to approve the 4th Quarter 2021 Endowment Fund Committee report previously distributed to the Council via email by the Endowment Fund Committee. All ayes.

Old Business

The Council discussed the goals reviewed at the January 19th meeting. Additional comments or action reported in RED.

ADMINISTRATIVE

- 1. In collaboration with the Communications ministry, see 1., 2., 4., 5., and 6. under Communications goals.
- 2. In collaboration with Record Management Taskforce, see 4. under Finance goals.
- 3. Assume responsibility for scheduling worship leaders.

- 6. Develop church security policy. Discussed electronic locks that can be easily reprogrammed.
- 7. Develop P/M/C 3-to-5-year capital needs list.

COMMUNICATIONS - Betty

- 1. Update & maintain <u>www.stpauljuddville.com</u> website & social media platforms to provide vital, timely, & interesting information to members & searchers.
- 2. Deactivate the <u>www.stpaullutheranjuddville.360.com</u> so no longer visible on internet.
- 3. Compile list of current internal/external communications & evaluate for effectiveness. Consider new methods to reach members & community.
- 4. Address the effectiveness, utilization, & cost of current 360 database.
- 5. Integrate Epistle newsletters into online platforms, i.e., FB.
- 6. Provide Wave synod weekly newsletter to members coordinating communicating publication and featuring articles in Epistle with congregation.

EVANGELISM - Jeff

- 1. Build a St. Paul men's ministry.
- 2. Increase communication with neighbors around Juddville.
- 3. Develop mission with other northern Door churches. (See Greg's suggestion re: interacting with another congregation)

FINANCE – Greg

- 1. Strive to meet annual ministry program through current year contributions without reducing cash reserves.
- 2. Seek members' assistance to increase Offerings throughout pandemic & during difficult January-March months when many members reside elsewhere.
