





Financial Update



- FYTD = Fiscal Year-to-Date. St. Paul Lutheran's fiscal year begins on 01-Oct.
- The 2021-22 fiscal year Ministry Expenses budget is \$250,954
- Regular Offerings in the eight months of the current fiscal year were greater than budgeted by \$10,891 (\$171,211 \$160,320) and \$318 higher than received in the comparable prior year period
- Ministry Expenses were higher year-over-year by \$18,678, principally reflecting higher Benevolence expenses, increased heating costs and a full year payment of insurance premiums (which were \$14,530, \$2,442 and \$950 higher, respectively)



- FYTD = Fiscal Year-to-Date. St. Paul Lutheran's fiscal year begins on 01-Oct.
- General Offerings in the first eight months of the 2021-22 fiscal year varied substantially (i.e., from a low of \$11,959 in November to a high of \$35,939 in December)
- Monthly Ministry Expenses were less variable, ranging from \$17,927 to \$31,019 in the current fiscal year-to-date period
- The higher Ministry Expenses recorded in December, February and March reflected the strong support for, and timing of, Benevolence disbursements (e.g., Ukraine Relief)

Council Highlights

JUNE COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Following are the highlights of the June 22nd Church Council meeting.

- ↓ Jeff led interactive devotions based on the 14 verses of Psalm 27.
- Council approved the Communications ministry request to purchase updated administrative software for the church office. "Instant Church Directory" (user-friendly, intuitive to work with, and less costly) replaces the current 360 software that has been in use for several years.
- Greg led a general budget planning overview covering a variety of expense-related items as well as back-up plans for some of the paid and volunteer church positions. The July meeting will be focused on budget preparation for presentation at the October annual congregation meeting.
- Karen reported that the local benevolence ministry has met and they will be making a recommendation for recipients in the 4th quarter, e.g. July-September.
- Steve Stringer, with the assistance of Tom Prohl, have volunteered to assist Peder Nelson with Property and Maintenance work during Peder's busy summer business season.
- Pastor Frank reported that the new global benevolence group will be meeting soon to present recommendations to council regarding funding a global organization.

Council Minutes

St. Paul Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes Wednesday, May 18, 2022

Mission: St. Paul Lutheran Church is a welcoming family bringing Christ into people's lives by developing, nurturing and supporting disciples.

Council Members Present: Cathy Durkin, Karen Peterson, Greg Ehlke, Bob Kufrin, Jeff Kuchenbecker and Pastor Frank (*all attending remotely via Zoom*) **Absent/Excused:** Betty Eisenhauer and Peder Nelson **Others Attendees:** None

Meeting Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Karen Peterson at 6:30 P.M.

Devotions

Cathy read a devotion.

Agenda Approval

The previously circulated agenda was reviewed and accepted by Cathy seconded by Jeff all aye.

<u>Minutes</u>

The previously circulated minutes from the April 2022 meeting, following a motion made by Greg and seconded by Jeff, were approved.

Record of Electronic Business Approval

There was no electronic business conducted since the last meeting.

REPORTS AND MINISTRY ACTION ITEMS

Pastor's Report

Pastor Frank discussed the challenges facing all the churches in the Synod to find replacement ministers who can fill in during a vacation or illness. Jeff urged Frank to work with the Council to be able to take his authorized vacation in a timely manner. Frank indicated that he has arranged for 3 of the 4 expected absences. The Synod is also dealing with a new bishop and attempting to sell their offices. The Synod also approved a deficit budget for the second year in a row. The Council discussed that funds would not be sent to the Synod until they get their finances in order.

Financial Report

The financial summary for April 2022, previously distributed by email for review and presented by Greg Ehlke, highlighted that Total Offerings for the month approximated \$18,100 and Ministry Expenses approximated \$18,900. This was the third straight month where Total Offerings were less than Ministry Expenses, in part due to sizable Benevolence Expenses disbursed in each month. Offerings in April were \$7,800 lower in than the comparable prior year month and approximately \$2,900 lower than budgeted. Ministry Expenses were approximately \$1,500 lower than in April 2021 and approximately equal to the budgeted amount. Offerings in April included \$1,990 of Offerings received for Ukraine Relief that were timely sent to Lutheran World Relief. Regular Offerings for the current seven-month fiscal year-to-date period totaled \$143,200, or approximately \$11,400 lower than the prior year period, but were \$2,900 higher than budgeted. Ministry Expenses totaled \$154,200 which was \$18,000 higher than the prior year period. Total Benevolence disbursements (made to benefit others locally and nationally) were \$14,500 higher than in the comparable prior year period while heating costs were \$1,900 higher, which were the principal reasons for the \$18,000 of higher Ministry Expenses.

The Ordinary Net Loss (excluding Dedicated Funds and Endowment-related activity) was approximately (\$10,600). The congregation's cash liquidity was sufficient to cover six months of Ministry Expenses as of April 30th.

The ELCA Foundation reported that its Endowment fund incurred a 1Q'22 loss of 5.05%. For St. Paul's two endowment funds that resulted in a loss of \$12,400 in our Everlasting Endowment Fund and \$3,100 in our Emergency Endowment Fund.

Greg then summarized two Financial Process documents he had prepared for the Council's review as part of his ongoing process to document important aspects of the Treasury function. Similar to last month's discussion of Insurance coverage, this month's summaries focused on descriptions of our seven Financial Accounts and Tax Filings and Payments.

Greg noted that it was appropriate to change the holders of a church credit card at this time. He recommended that Amy Jo Campbell's credit card be rescinded given her recent move out of Door County and that Shawn Mathys be given a credit card. To retain important internal controls given current Financial Secretary responsibilities, Greg requested that prior to Shawn using that card for a bona fide charge for the church, she obtains email or written approval of the charge from the Council President or Vice President. The Council concurred with the Treasurer's recommendations.

Upon motion made by Bob and seconded by Karen, the Council approved the financial report and ordered that the April 2022 Financial Summary, along with the financial statements and schedules provided to the Council, be filed with the records of the meeting.

PASTOR FRANK

Discussed the importance of communion on Sundays and the Council authorized the purchase of a mini fridge to store the communion wine for Sunday services if necessary. Motion by Bob second by Greg all aye. Continue to preach, teach, administer the Sacraments rightly, equip the saints for ministry and provide pastoral care (From Letter of Call) using holy imagination.

COMMUNICATION

Due to Betty's unexpected absence her issues were tabled to the next meeting.

PROPERTY AND MAINTENANCE

Karen related the business issues that Pedar is facing at the start of the season and the needs of the Church related to the Cemetery and building maintenance. The Council discussed options and the possibility that other members could step up and help with the painting of the Fellowship Hall basement, playground chipping and clean up as well as the cemetery oversight. Someone needs to approve the paint color for the Fellowship Hall. Jeff indicated that he is still waiting for an update on the delivery and installation of the audio equipment order for outdoor services. It is also possible the equipment can be used on the boat trip. Jeff estimates that the Church will need around 20 additional folding chairs for the outdoor services. Greg was authorized to get the chairs.

SUMMER ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

Betty has developed a list of tasks for different events and Pedar has a checklist for the church service to be held on the NorDoor boat. Greg stated the Church golf outing will likely be held on July 31 at Maxwelton Braes at 1:00 pm. The date for the summer picnic has not been set. The Council agreed that alcohol would not be permitted to be consumed on Church property during Church events, but Church events held off Church property would be subject to that owner's policies and procedures.

The Council the boating trip for members and the related picnic and urged members to sign up.

<u>Adjournmen</u>t:

There being no other business, the meeting adjourned at 8:0 P.M. with the praying of The Lord's Prayer. Motion by Karen seconded by Greg. All ayes.
