

Local Benevolence 4th Quarter – 2022 report

Greetings! Following is our final financial allocation for this year. Our giving continues with the diaper drive, food pantry collection, and kid knits. We've done a lot this year and our community needs us.

<u>The Ministry Fund</u> – Door County Medical Center: Goes directly to help people struggling financially with bills ranging from medicine/ medical equipment, shelter, transportation, utilities, etc.

<u>115 Club</u>: Dedicated to helping people involved in any 12-step recovery program, primarily for alcohol or drug addiction. They host many AA meetings at the Sturgeon Bay site and sponsor alcohol free events. Funds are needed to help pay the mortgage.

<u>Neighbor to Neighbor</u>: We will be purchasing adult incontinence products (ie. Depends) for their clients. The need is great, and like baby diapers, these can be hard on budgets.

<u>Crossways Camping Ministries</u>: Their mission statement is "Bringing people together in Christ so lives are changed and communities enhanced." These Lutheran based camps have hosted kids and families since the 1940's. Financially they are struggling since the pandemic.

<u>Lakeshore CAP</u>: This agency has over a dozen community programs. These include housing/ rent assistance, family development and resources, a food pantry, employment skill enhancement, GED assistance, and JAK's Place (focusing on mental wellness). We will request that our gift be used in Door County.

A New Global Mission Opportunity Just for You!

St Paul's has always reached into the local community to serve those in need. Now, as a congregation, we have a new way to serve others in need of health and healing beyond Door County. That's the mission of Compassion International.

Compassion International, based in Colorado Springs, CO, is a faith-based ministry serving the needs of impoverished children in third world countries. Compassion's approach is holistic, meaning it focuses on a child's spiritual, mental, physical and emotional needs. Compassion partners with local churches where children attend a child development center. Center staff teach bible stories which tell of Jesus's love for all children; tutor children to read, write and learn basic life skills; provide nutritious meals and clean drinking water and shore up a child's self-esteem by showing them they are loved and valued.

Sponsoring a child involves a monthly payment of \$38 as well as a commitment to regularly write and pray for the child. In addition to individuals sponsoring a child, church groups can band together to sponsor a child. Sponsors choose a child based on what interests them: a certain country, boy or girl, age of the child, etc... In lieu of sponsoring a child, one-time gifts can be given to various funds: child survival, disaster relief, unsponsored children, etc...

Connections





Financial Update



- FYTD = Fiscal Year-to-Date. St. Paul Lutheran's fiscal year begins on 01-Oct.
- The 2021-22 fiscal year Ministry Expenses budget is \$250,954
- Regular Offerings in the first ten months of the current fiscal year were greater than budgeted by \$15,197 (\$215,597 - \$200,400) and \$13,669 higher than received in the comparable prior year period



- FYTD = Fiscal Year-to-Date. St. Paul Lutheran's fiscal year begins on 01-Oct.
- July's General Offerings (\$32,252) were the second highest of this fiscal year
- General Offerings in the first ten months of the 2021-22 fiscal year varied substantially (from a low of \$11,959 in November to a high of \$35,939 in December)
- Monthly Ministry Expenses were less variable, ranging from \$17,927 to \$31,019
- The higher Ministry Expenses recorded in December, February and March reflected strong support for, and timing of, Benevolenced is bursements (e.g., Ukraine Relief)

Council Highlights

AUGUST COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Following are the highlights of the August 17th Church Council meeting.

- > Cathy shared a story about relationships and roles growing up and how they shaped her life.
- ➤ With \$7,000 in the budget, 4th quarter local benevolence recipients were approved as follows:
 - -\$1,000 to Door County Memorial Hospital's Ministry Fund to help people with financial bills ranging from medicine/medical equipment to shelter, transportation, utilities, etc.
 - -\$1,000 to the 115 Club to assist people primarily involved in the 12-step alcohol and drug addiction programs.
 - -\$500 for Neighbor to Neighbor to purchase adult incontinence products.
 - -\$2,000 to CrossWays Camping Ministry, whose mission since the 1940's has been bringing people together in Christ so lives are changed and communities enhanced.
 - -\$2,500 to Lakeshore CAP to provide housing/rental assistance, family development, employment skills enhancement, GED assistance, JAK's Place (focusing on mental wellness) and a food pantry.
- > Greg reviewed the updated budget projections and projects for the upcoming fiscal year and indicated a final proposal will be presented at the September council meeting.
- ➤ Based on the responsibility of the council, as stated in the constitution, it was agreed that we reach out to individuals who have not worshiped, communed, or financially supported St. Paul in the past year two years to understand their future commitment.
- > A suggestion was made to plan a fall work day: this idea will be coordinated with the Property and Maintenance team.

The full council-approved minutes of the August meeting will be published in the October Epistle. In the meantime, feel free to contact any member of council with questions or comments.

ST. PAUL LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES July 20, 2022

Mission: St. Paul Lutheran Church is a welcoming family bringing Christ into people's lives by developing, nurturing and supporting disciples.

Meeting Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Betty Eisenhauer at 6:36 P.M.

Devotions

Bob read a devotion from Matthew 6:19-24 regarding putting your money where your heart is.

Agenda Approval

Betty made a motion to accept the agenda and it was approved unanimously.

Minutes

Greg made a motion to approve the June 20 meeting minutes, seconded by Bob, and it was approved unanimously.

Electronic Business Conducted since June Meeting

There were two Urgent Need requests approved by the Executive Committee, one for a member and the other for a non-member each for \$200.

Reports & Action Items

Pastor's Report – Pastor Frank stated the Council and membership should celebrate (i) the efforts of the Local Benevolence Committee doing more for the community of faith, (ii) more members stepping up to use their musical talents and (iii) the Praise Band concert that was enjoyed by 25 people. Pastor Frank stated he is reaching out to members he doesn't see often at church. He noted his vacation will be taken from July 21 to July 28. He noted that Mary is doing more records management and digital organization.

Financial Report – Greg noted that recent monthly giving to the Church has been less that the budget projected. The Council will need to recommend a budget for the next year and he is hopeful that the contributions will return to the normal level of giving so Church programs can continue at the same level. For the month of June, contributions were down \$2,500 compared to the prior year month even though online giving was \$6,300. For the nine month year-to-date period, Regular Offerings were about \$2,300 lower than last year. If the current trends continue, as detailed in the initial budget draft provided to the Council for review, Offerings for the 2021-

22 fiscal year would approximate \$237,811 and Ministry Expenses would approximate \$256,799, a shortfall of \$18,988 before any Endowment funds are applied.

Greg reviewed the process for developing a budget for next year. The Council is required to meet the compensation, vacation and benefits guidelines established by the Synod for Pastor Frank. The Council feedback to the initial 2022-23 budget draft was that the final budget should emphasize meeting the congregation's 2022-23 mission objectives rather than being driven by austerity measures in a potentially difficult economic environment. Motion by Bob, seconded by Cathy, to approve the financial report. All ayes.

Nominations for Council Membership – Betty discussed the Council terms and whose terms were expiring. New members will need to be approved at the Annual Congregation Meeting in October.

Betty: Term expires in October and not staying on Council.

Karen: Term expires in October and will seek to stay for three more years.

Jeff: Term expires in two more years. Cathy: Term expires in two more years. Greg: Term expires in two more years. Bob: Term expires in one more year.

Peder: Unknown Term expires in one more year.

3rd Quarter Local Benevolence Recipients

Karen reported on the recommendations of the Committee which were:

\$750 for Neighbor to Neighbor \$250 for Habitat for Humanity \$500 for NEW Family services

She noted that there is \$7,000 unallocated after these donations are approved. She also mentioned that St. Paul is holding a disposable diaper and wipes drive. Motion by Karen seconded by Jeff. All aye.

Old Business

Budget Planning —The Council will see several drafts before presenting a recommended budget to the Congregation in October. Discussion was held concerning potential Staff Ministry wage and salary increases relative to recent inflationary trends and the range of Offerings that may occur in the coming year. The Council plans to write a letter to members explaining the financial needs and importance of giving and worship attendance to sustain the church's ministries.

Mileage Reimbursement – The Council approved an increase in Pastor Frank's annual car allowance from \$5,500 to \$6,000 consistent with the recently announced IRS mid-year increase for mileage reimbursement. Motion by Greg, seconded by Bob to approve the increase effective July 1, 2022, which results in an increased expense of \$125 for the last quarter of the current fiscal year.

Global Benevolence Distribution – Pastor Frank explained the group is working to develop a recommendation for August or September. One of the challenges is to define "global." Does it mean outside of Door County, but in our region, the State, United States or the World?

New Business

Fellowship Ministry Reactivation – Betty reported a fellowship coffee hour will begin again between the first and second service based on volunteer interest and coordination. COVID numbers are rising again and outside fellowship should be safe, but not in the Fellowship Hall. Jeff and the Stadtmuellers will work to set it up in the vestibule this coming Sunday.

Greg reported on the golf outing set for July 31st. He noted that attendance for the recent NorDoor boat church service and picnic was very good and that an Offering of \$1,258 was received from the boat worship service which was being used to benefit people in need through HELP of Door County.

Adjournment

There being no other business, the meeting adjourned at 8:00 P.M. with the praying of The Lord's Prayer.
