St. Paul is blessed with an abundance of talented musicians who share their gifts during worship, and further blessed to be surrounded by musicians in our community. While we are grateful for all those who have come forward, we also suspect that there are others who have yet to be given the opportunity to share musical talents as a part of worship.

In many congregations, it is customary to have a person who coordinates the efforts of various musicians, to "grease the skids," so to speak, for musicians coming forward to serve. St. Paul has had a more piecemeal approach, which has worked to a degree, but a more coordinated effort would be ideal.

Therefore, St. Paul is seeking an individual to serve as Music Ministry Coordinator. The person in this position would schedule musicians, including pianists, song leaders, and those providing special music and also coordinate choir appearances when that again becomes a reality.

As a part of this ministry, the coordinator would also seek out those with talent, whether within our membership or in the greater community, and then encourage and equip these musicians to use their gifts to enhance worship. Any plans would be communicated to the church office in order to make worship planning as seamless as possible.

LOCAL BENEVOLENCE

Greetings! St. Paul's has supported the STRIDE Program for a number of years but it's still unfamiliar to some of us. STRIDE stands for Strengthening Trust and Resilience, Instilling Independence, and Discovering Empowerment. This program is dedicated to bringing access to quality mental health treatment to Door County youth, an area that was previously lacking.

The STRIDE program is in its third year and works by bringing professional mental health providers to our 5 school districts. On-line services have been added as have group programs. Unfortunately, school counselors are reporting extremely high rates of anxiety among students. Good mental health is a priority issue for any age group!

Here are a few stats on the STRIDE program:



-Last year 49 students received one on one counseling. Additional hours are being added this year.

-The Mighty Teen Club was started. This is a virtual art journaling club that helps students manage stress. Last year 112 youth took part in this group.

-Over 1400 mental wellness kits were assembled and distributed to all elementary students in our 5 school districts.

The STRIDE providers communicate with school staff and administration, as well as students and their parents, to improve awareness and the importance of good mental health for our youth.



HIGHLIGHTS OF DECEMBER COUNCIL Meeting

The December Epistle mentioned that council was going to have a separate planning meeting in January when the agenda would be devoted to our mission statement as inspiration for council's goals and objectives. Specifically, if our mission statement says that *St. Paul is a welcoming family bringing Christ into people's lives by developing, nurturing and supporting disciples,* are we as a community of faith and its leaders living it out?

Pastor Frank led the conversation by asking the questions, "What does our baptism mean; how are we following the faith practices in our affirmation of baptism?" We talked about how council members make a public statement each year reaffirming our baptismal covenant. Following that, we deliberated on the words of our mission statement - asking (perhaps rhetorically) if we are welcoming and if our goals bring Christ into people's lives by developing, nurturing and supporting disciples. Attempting to answer that question only led to another question: By living out our mission, are there "marks" of our actions left on our community of faith and the world?

Using these questions as guidelines for future work and discussion, we circled back to the goals and objectives each Council member had submitted. Ultimately, Pastor asked each of us to rewrite one or two of our goals in biblical language intentionally driven by our mission: a challenging, but necessary assignment that will be the basis for our February council meeting agenda.

With thanks to the Lord, this could be the start of something big!



FINANCIAL UPDATE



- FYTD = Fiscal Year-to-Date. St. Paul Lutheran's fiscal year begins on 01-Oct.
- The 2021-22 fiscal year Ministry Expenses budget is \$250,954
- Regular Offerings in the three months of the current fiscal year were greater than budgeted by \$8,128 (\$68,248 \$60,120) but were (\$2,350) or (3%) less than received in the Fourth Quarter of 2020
- Ministry Expenses were higher than in the prior year period by \$4,542, principally reflecting a full year payment of Insurance premiums, higher Local Benevolence expenses and increased Communications/Advertising expenses (which were \$1,649, \$3,500 and \$1,300 higher, respectively), partially offset by \$1,386 of lower Building/Maintenance expenses



- FYTD = Fiscal Year-to-Date. St. Paul Lutheran's fiscal year begins on 01-Oct.
- Offerings in the first three months of the 2021-22 fiscal year varied substantially (i.e., \$20,350 in October, \$11,959 in November, and \$35,939 in December, respectively)
- Ministry Expenses were less variable as \$19,807 of Ministry Expenses were incurred in October, \$17,927 in November and \$24,469 in December
- The variability of monthly Offerings highlights the need for strong ongoing liquidity management

Council Meeting Minutes

Wednesday, December 15, 2021

Mission: St. Paul Lutheran Church is a welcoming family bringing Christ into people's lives by developing, nurturing and supporting disciples.

Council Members Present: Betty Eisenhauer, Cathy Durkin, Peder Nelson, Karen Peterson, Greg Ehlke, Bob Kufrin, Jeff Kuchenbecker and Pastor Frank (*all attending remotely via Zoom given COVID-19 pandemic social distancing*)

Absent/Excused: None

Others Attendees: None

Meeting Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Betty Eisenhauer at 6:30 P.M.

Devotions

Peder provided an opening devotion and a prayer.

Agenda Approval

The previously circulated agenda was reviewed and accepted by acclamation.

Minutes

The previously circulated minutes from the November 17, 2021 meeting, following a motion made by Jeff and seconded by Greg, were approved.

Record of Electronic Business Approval

Betty reported that the Council Executive Committee approved an Urgent Need request for \$500 by email since the November meeting.

REPORTS AND MINISTRY ACTION ITEMS

Pastor's Report:

Pastor Frank provided a report on various matters. Several members who had been in the hospital had been released and returned home. Nursing home and hospital visits remain challenging due to Covid-19.

Financial Report:

- Greg reported that offerings for the first two months of the 2021-22 fiscal year have been weak. Regular Offerings (excluding Urgent Need and Special donations received such as World Hunger and Global Benevolences) totaled \$31,700. Regular Offering donations were \$8,300 lower than budgeted for the months of October and November, the first two months of the new fiscal year period. Ministry Expenses of \$37,700 for the two months were about \$300 higher than a year ago. The Church's liquidity position remains strong - undesignated cash balances of approximately \$117,900 would cover almost six months of Ministry Expenses without reliance on future Offerings received.
- Greg reported that the Endowment Fund is up 11% for the first ten months of the calendar year. Regular Offering donations were about \$8,300 lower than budgeted for the month of October (the first month of the new fiscal year period).
- Betty recommended that Mary, Doreen, Chris and Shawn would receive a Door County gift card in the amount of \$100. Motion by Jeff seconded by Greg all aye.
- Greg recommended that Pastor Frank's housing allowance would remain at \$25,000 for the 2021-2022 fiscal year. The Council will consider a change next October 2022 for the following 12-month period. Motion by Bob seconded by Jeff all aye.
- Greg discussed the Fred Weber Memorial Fund account which currently has \$5,700. After discussing possible uses, the Council decided to retain the funds for the future benefit of St. Paul's youth.
- Greg reported on the 3Q'21 federal tax filing which included a claim for an Employee Retention Tax Credit.
- Motion by Karen seconded by Cathy to approve the financial report. All ayes.
- Local Benevolences:
- Karen reported on the proposed recipients of local benevolences for the first quarter of the fiscal year. The Ministry is concerned about the impact of the pandemic on the mental health of individuals of all ages. The organizations recommended are as follows:

Help of Door County -- \$1,500

Stride (children's mental health) -- \$1,500

CAP -- \$500

Motion by Jeff seconded by Greg to approve the donations as listed. All ayes.

Personnel:

Betty and Pastor Frank reported on Mary Sawyer's performance since she started and Pastor indicated that she is doing an excellent job and increased her hourly rate as agreed upon when she was hired.

Old Business:

The Council reviewed the progress made on the 2021 goals and objectives established last year as follows:

<u>Worship & Music:</u> Cathy indicated that due to the changes caused by the pandemic the Ministry has decided to review the role of worship and music in the Church and the goals for the next year. The Committee has decided to hold open the position of Music Coordinator until the Church can open up to normal operations.

<u>Property, Maintenance & Cemetery:</u> Peder reported that painting interior church areas is on hold. He will be reviewing whether the upholstered chairs have been steam cleaned. Carpets have been steam cleaned. The parking lot and striping was completed in 20212 and new gutters were installed on the portico. He indicated that the cemetery policy has been finalized and hopes to establish a Cemetery Association committee.

<u>Technology</u>: Bob reported that Starlink has indicated that we will likely get service in the summer of 2022. He is also working on an inventory of the technology equipment and will have a recommended replacement plan for the 2022-23 budget. The Committee will also review the age of the software and backup options.

<u>Finance:</u> Greg indicated that he is working on developing additional financial policies with Shawn's assistance as well as a record retention policy. He also indicated that the Church needed a capital needs plan and regular budget amount for major expenditures. He is going to coordinate development of a Memorial Fund list of potential items that may assist donors when making contributions to honor the memory of loved ones.

<u>Pastoral Considerations</u>: Pastor Frank discussed how seriously the COVID pandemic has impacted the Church and the local community. He is concerned the members are losing their connection to the church and even after contacting a number of members he felt challenged to improve that relationship. He asked the Council to think about how they and all the members could do more outreach to existing members.

<u>Pastor Frank:</u> indicated that pastoral care to members at home or in care settings continued to be his major weekly challenge especially with COVID.

New Business:

Regarding the 2022 goals submitted by the members for this meeting, it was agreed by all that the Council would table the agenda item until the January meeting to focus specifically on this as the single agenda item so there can be in-depth reflection and meaningful discussion.

Adjournment:

There being no other business, the meeting adjourned at 8:05 P.M. with the praying of The Lord's Prayer.

Next Council Meeting:

Wednesday, January 19, 2022 at 1:00 P.M. in person at the Church (if pandemic conditions so permit on-site gatherings at that time.)
